Lou DeNicola said he was fishing on Howard Thurman's boat, 9 miles east of St. Mary at KBY. We were having a good day on keeper Drum and sheepshead but kept breaking off when something big took our fiddlers. Changed to 100 lb leader on a 65lb braid and used 1/4 blue crab. Instantly Howard hooked up and caught an estimated 100 lb Drum. I took about 10 minutes to get this 50 pounder. Both swam off unharmed.





Hi there everyone! I am going to give you something to think about, as far as fishing, and the "Conventional, local wisdom" goes.

For those of you that don't know me very well, I moved back to Florida after being born in Lakeland, Fl, 70 years ago. I have

been here for 14 years now and while I haven't gotten to do as much fishing here as I would like to, I have been fishing and free-dive spear fishing since I was about 9 years old and got Scuba certified in 1964.

I got my degree in Oceanography from California University at Humboldt, with secondary degrees in: Marine Zoology, Marine Biology, Marine Fisheries, and Wild Life Management. (I also like to hunt.)

From about 1968, I was fishing and diving on the West Coast mostly North of San Francisco. I averaged about 400 hours on the boat engine every summer, with probably as many hours just drifting with the engine off. (We NEVER anchored out there.) We usually only had part of June, July, August, and part of September for fishing because of the weather.

First, about FISH in general. Fish are not smart in any sense. Their brain is nothing more than a bunch of nerves with three main functions. Eating, avoiding being eaten, and reproducing. That is it, their total capacity!

Fish do not see your leader and think: Hummmm, that looks like a trap!

They do not learn from being hooked. I was Salmon fishing one day and a guy came on the VHF and said:

"IF anyone catches a big Salmon with a Penn GLD 45 hanging out of it's mouth, that is MY fish and Rod & Reel."

Naturally everyone gave him a bad time for not hanging on to his rod, but about 20 minutes later someone came on the VHF and asked if he was still out there. They had caught his fish with the lure still hanging out of it's mouth and the Rod & Reel still being dragged around. He kept the 45 lb Salmon, but gave the guy his Rod & Reel back.

Lesson learned from this.... Having a lure hanging out of it's mouth didn't stop it from hitting

another lure just like the one it had in it's mouth. SLOW LEARNERS!

Our studies show that fish really don't feel pain. After all, they eat all kinds of things with sharp pointy spines!

Now for Trolling

There really isn't any deep secret to this. Just remember that fish see ANY disturbance in the water as a possible feeding opportunity and will go to it to investigate it for food.

Think of trolling like this, your boat is a disturbance in the water. The lures you are trolling behind it are possible FOOD!

When I troll I try to get my boat to make as much noise and splash as I can. I trim my engine up as high as I can so my boat plows through the water and does not get up on plane (about 10 MPH).

Now remember to keep your lures close to the boat. I run my "flat lines" off the corner of the boat and about 20 yards behind the boat. I try to position it just on the edge of the wake or bubble water from my prop. I like it on the back of the second wave created by my boat. NO, that is not too close. I have had fish hit my bait right AT my transom. My next two are about 15 to 20 yards further back, just where the bubbles from the engine are starting to fade out. I like these lures to be about 5 feet outside the flat lines, running just in the clear water by the wake. IF you run a "Way Back" line, it should be in the center of your wake, just where the water is getting back to normal. NOT way, way, way, back, where it takes you 20 minutes to reel it in.

Remember, your boat is what attracts the fish, and they will be looking for food near it!

Temperature breaks are more important than structure! I'll repeat that again. Temperature breaks are more important than structure!

Remember, fish are not rocket scientist, they don't see your gear and think "This looks wrong, or I see a hook, that is not for me." If it looks like food, or like it is alive and might be food, they will try to eat it.,

One last thought, don't over tighten your drag, it will wear YOU out. Let the fish run and wear itself out; then bring it to the boat!

IF you don't read this and write letters to your Congress Representative and Senator, you might as well sell your boat!

This information is from the March issue of the "Saltwater Sportsman" magazine.

While we are all in the same boat, Commercial and Sport Fisherman, we need to work together, not let NOAA have us fighting between ourselves. NOAA and their SAMFC (South Atlantic Marine Fisheries Council) and GMFC (Gulf Marine Fisheries Council) have been run by the antifishing interest - NOT Economics as mandated by the Magnuson-Stevens Act. Here are some of the FACTS.

Commercial fishing for 2014 had a total value of \$ 5.4 Billion dollars. That is from the Pacific Coast, Alaska, Gulf of Mexico, and Atlantic Coast combined.

5.4 BILLION DOLLARS! That is **NOTHING** compared to the VALUE of Recreational Fishing!

Recreational fishing had a total value of \$23.4 Billion + Dollars!

That is almost 5 times the value of Commercial fishing!

10.4 million anglers took 68 Million trips in 2014, and they caught 392 Million Fish!

10 Million anglers, 4 million fish.....

That means 6 Million anglers got skunked!

Of that 392 million fish caught, 60% of those fish were released! The total harvest was estimated at 155 million fish, weighing 186 million pounds. (Someone, and YOU know who you are, are catching an awful lot of little fish!);-)

NOAA is ignoring the laws as the Magnuson-Stevens Act states that the reason for the law is to "Maximize the value to the Nation of our resources."

The Recreational Fishery creates many times the economic impact of the Commercial Fishery, but it does so with approximately 3% of the fin fish resource, yet we get NO economic impact coverage in the 2014 NOAA report to the Congress and people of this country!

For the greater Jacksonville area, That is the Florida Georgia border, to the South City limits of

of St. Augustine in a loop back around the city of Jacksonville. The economic impact of Saltwater Recreational fishing is over \$600 Million dollars EVERY YEAR! Each and every year we bring in over \$600 Million dollars to the local economy of the Jacksonville area! Year after Year after Year!

That is more than the Super Bowl brought in and the city does not spend much on improving or maintaining the infrastructure that we use. We are a vital asset to the Jacksonville economy.

The SAMFC has decided that this year will

NOT have a Red Snapper season! The reason....

The stock is recovering too well, so we are catching too many that we have to throw back, and with their made up (* PROVEN to be totally wrong by a Past President of the GMFC.) mortality rate, 60% + of released fish, we are killing too many, so we can't have a season this year to off set the fish we "Killed by throwing them back."

They now WANT to close all bottom fishing!
We can NOT let them get away with this!
Write the Mayor and each City Council
member with this information, and we need to write
our Governor, your State and US Congress person
and Senators, and have them abolish the NOAA's
Marine fisheries Councils.

For over 40 years they have done nothing except hurt fishing and the economics of this country with their rules based on POLITICS not science.

(* "Shipp chartered the Lady Ann out of Dauphin Island on Aug. 6, 2009 for one of his regular snapper research cruises. On each trip, he tags and releases hundreds of snapper from both public and secret artificial reefs off Alabama. On this cruise, he said, the goal was to sample several popular public reefs to see if they had been "fished out" during the 70-day snapper season.

The answer, Shipp said, was a resounding NO! While several hundred legal-sized snapper, including some up to 15 pounds, came aboard the boat, only one legal triggerfish and no legal grouper were caught. Eleven tagged fish were recaptured, including several that had been tagged just nine days before, proving the fish recover quickly from being caught, Shipp said."

Do you know your Life Jacket Laws?

Type - I - Offshore, over 20 Lbs of Buoyancy, will turn an unconscious person face up.

Type - II - Near Shore Minimum 15.5 Lbs Buoyancy, will turn an unconscious person face up.

Type - III - Minimum 15.5 Buoyancy, will NOT turn an unconscious person face up.

Type - IV - Minimum 16.5 Lbs Buoyancy your THROWABLE device.

Type - V - Special use device Must be used in accordance with requirements on the label.

A Type - V may be substituted for any Type I, II, or III BUT it must be worn while the vessel is underway.

Every person age 6 and under MUST wear a Type I, II, or III while the vessel is underway.

Personal Watercraft must wear a Type I, II, III or V life jacket, Inflatable PDF's are PROHIBITED!

WaterSkiers must wear a Type I, II, or III Life Jacket, **Inflatable PDF's are PROHIBITED!**



Wear these, at least, while you are underway. They don't work in the cabin! Most people fall overboard while underway!

Never Approach the dock any faster than you want to RAM the DOCK!



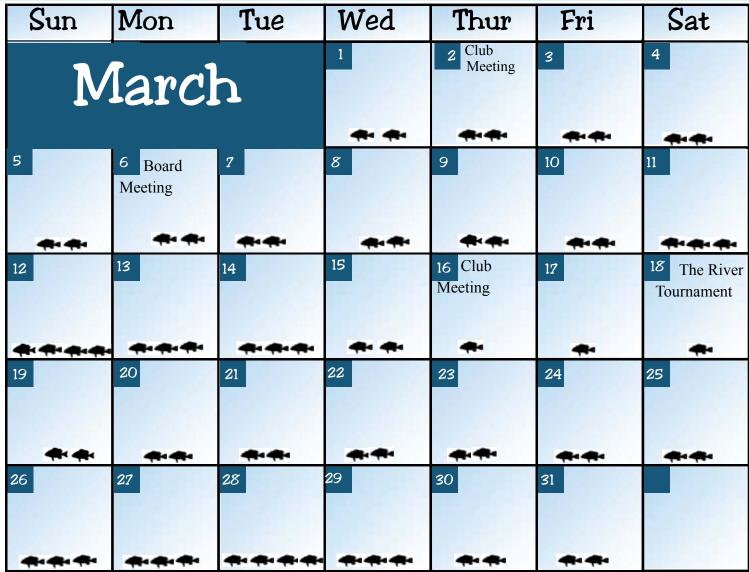
