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
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ANNUAL CLUB BIRTHDAY / PAST PRESIDENTS PARTY JUNE 7TH, 2018 JOIN US!

With the last tournament held on May 12th being the May Trolling Tournament we have had the points spread narrow drastically.

Tom Darga our Tournament Director wrote this report:

You know one of these days the weather people are going to get it right. Once again on Saturday May 12th the club hosted its May Trolling Tournament with 12 boats fishing. The weather was calling for 2 to 3 ft swells at 9 second intervals. Well it was 2' to 3' with occasional 4' but definitely not 9 seconds more like 3 seconds.

The winds were out of the Southeast. This made for a bumpy ride all day. In honor of the Sailfish Pot Party that was that evening, the weigh station was opened at 1:00PM with half of the group weighing in by 2:00 to 2:30 PM. Kings are on the beach and over the wrecks. There were even some Blackfin Tuna and Barracuda brought in for weighing.

Economic Impacts of Recreational Sport Fishing Jacksonville Metropolitan Area

Background:

Sport fishing in Northeast Florida has a significant and frequently underestimated impact on the local economy. Duval County contains a unique expanse of both fresh and saltwater fishing environments. It is one of the few places in the United States where you have world class freshwater, estuary and ocean fishing environments in and around a major metropolitan area.

Jacksonville's notable status as a fishing destination is backed up by being the host city for America's largest Kingfish competition – The Greater Jacksonville Kingfish Tournament, and the JOSFC's El Cheapo Sheepshead Tournament. The waters offshore the First Coast are home to the largest artificial reef program on the eastern seaboard. By some estimates, more than half of the inland saltmarsh on the Atlantic Coast is located in Northeast Florida and Southeast Georgia. When it comes to fishing, Jacksonville is a "grand slam" city.

The findings that follow are based on Florida retail sales of recreational fishing licenses as reported by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission as well as the Commission's statewide assessment of economic impact. **Findings:**

FWC reports the current annual economic impact for Florida fishing as:

Saltwater	\$5,691,949,544	54,516
Freshwater	\$2,630,617,741	24,805
Total	\$8,322,567,285	79,321

Conclusions and Recommendations:

The Jacksonville metro economic impact of recreational

fishing, at **OVET** one half billion dollars annually, is significant. To put this in perspective, the economic impact of sport fishing in the metro area is as large as the most optimistic estimates of the impact from Jacksonville's 2005 Super Bowl venture. Jacksonville sport fishing is essentially an economic Super Bowl, every year! Year after year after year!

Among the economic extenders related to sport fishing, but not quantified in the reported numbers, include the affect world class recreational fishing availability has on quality of life. We know people have come to Jacksonville and located a business here for the lifestyle and outdoor opportunities the area provides. This offers a "no cost" economic incentive to locate, or relocate a business here and should be a part of the economic development marketing appeals promoted by the city.

Government interest in the Jacksonville metro community should take a more proactive approach in supporting and facilitating the fishing community. While the City of Jacksonville has begun to move forward on new access for kayakers and boaters, these actions have not kept pace with growth.

Summary Recommendations:

Have the City of Jacksonville Legislative Affairs Chief actively solicit the reduction of restricted access zones in the St. Johns River as imposed by federal agencies.

- Relocate non-fishing/boating recreational interest from boat ramp facilities (where possible) to new city locations.
- Create a long term plan for boating, shoreline and fishing access in the Jacksonville area addressing population growth and economic development concerns.

TOP'S TIPS SAFETY FIRST

READING THE WEATHER With the advent of warmer weather, we will be spending more and more time on the water with our boating and fishing activities. After reviewing club member Ron Carr's information about the two fishermen who drowned, after being caught in a midday storm while fishing on a large fresh water lake in Alabama, I thought I should remind all members of the need to be constantly aware of the current weather situation when out on the water.

The two fishermen, mentioned above, were seasoned boaters and were aware that a storm was imminent. No one knows exactly what happened, but the two fishermen were found dead the next day attached to their capsized boat, but without their life jackets on. Life jackets were still on the boat. There are many unanswered questions from this tragedy, but one thing is certain. Your life jacket will work only if it is worn. Even if you do not wear it at all times, keep it near by so you can put it on in case bad weather approaches, or other situations arise that would require you to don it quickly.

As we move into the warmer months with more daylight hours, and increasing temperatures, we must be alert to the ever increasing afternoon thunderstorms. In order to have a safe outing, boaters have a special need to know and understand the weather. On land, the effects of storms can be devastating. At sea, they can be even worse. High winds, lightning, rough seas and poor visibility are some of the side effects of storms at sea. The first step in avoiding weather related problems is "know before you go." This means you need reliable weather information before you go out on the water. Even if good weather is predicted, it can change while you are out. At least as important as knowing what weather to expect on your trip, is knowing how to tell when the weather is changing for the worse, or how to read the obvious signs. Therefore, we must understand how high and low pressure air masses impact our weather. Air masses with high pressure contain cool, dry air and low pressure contains warm, moist air. In the US, these air masses move mainly from west to east.


In the Northern Hemisphere, air flows clockwise around a high and counterclockwise around

a low. Therefore, since a high moving toward a low may have high winds, the area between the high and low may have stormy weather. Thus, it is important to know where the highs and lows are in relation to your location on the water.

To locate the highs and lows in our area, stand with your back to the surface wind. Then, turn 45 degrees to your right which will align you with the winds aloft. After you have turned 45 degrees to the right, the low-pressure area will normally be to your left. The high area will be to your right with the resulting pressure area to the west the one that will reach you and the one to the east has already passed you. Therefore, if the pressure system to the west is low, weather conditions may deteriorate and you should make plans accordingly.

Clouds also tell us when bad weather is approaching. The one you want to pay close attention to is the cumulonimbus thunderhead or anvil shaped cloud. It usually signals a cold front moving at 10 to 30 knots with winds as high as 30-60 knots in a squall line. Gusts of wind may exceed 80-100 knots, which could present dangerous boating conditions with high seas and heavy rain followed by clearing. If caught in this condition, head into the waves and maintain position as the rough weather should pass shortly. If you must head back to port, try and cross the waves at a 45 degree angle and run a zigzag course back to port to prevent pounding into the waves and possible capsizing or pitch poling.

Know before you go, pay attention to changing weather conditions and continue to enjoy safe boating throughout the year. Top Ingram Fish Tales
