


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What's in Your Ditch Bag?





Boating accidents, they happen every week. Usually the difference between a sad ending and a happy ending is preparedness. Since you can't

always count on Lady Luck (In case you haven't noticed, you are in a predicament because she isn't with you today, she's fickle, in case you haven't heard), the best thing to do is be like a Boy Scout. Veteran captains going offshore - no matter what size boat they are in -- carry emergency "ditch bags" because they never know when the catastrophic might happen.

OK, lets get started.... Your Ditch Bag should be a container that will FLOAT, is secured closed so that if your boat overturns or goes down, it will be on the surface with you, and all of it's contents inside. When you leave the dock, it should be sitting on deck, NOT in the cabin or a locker.

I have seen everything from Ice-Chest that latched shut as ditch bags to \$300 specially made ditch bags. These soft sided insulated coolers will work quite well, just make sure it will float with a full load of your gear.

Now for what you put inside. This can vary a lot from boat or Captain to Captain.

The little Sailfish signify priority items! You should have your required flares. (Make sure they are not out of date.) I also carry several arial flares or rockets.

First Aid supplies.

A good waterproof sun block. Neutrogena now makes one (SPF 70) that goes on wet skin, kind of handy if you are already in the water.

You should have some rope to tie everyone together so you don't drift apart. (A group of people are easier to spot than a single person.)

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Ditch Bag Continued

Your bag should have a waterproof strobe light attached to it. (Be sure to test it before every trip, and change the batteries once a year.)

) A signal mirror works well in bright daylight to get attention.

Drinking Water! This is left out of most ditch bags because most people do not think of it. A single gallon of water will help keep up to 4 people from becoming dehydrated for a couple of days.

Whistles for everyone! It beats yelling 10 ways to 1. Yelling is exhausting, and uses up a lot of energy, and can not be heard for a very long distance, whistles carry for a mile or more! At the least you should have a PLB (Personal Locator Beacon) like a Spot. Or an EPIRB

A drift marker is nice. It is a long 20 or so foot long bright red streamer that floats out along the surface to increase your spotablity from the air.

A bright die marker also helps increase your spotablity from the air, but it does dissipate, so maybe a couple of them.

If you can afford it, a hand held VHF, and a hand held GPS unit.

I also carry several Chem-Lights or Glo Sitcks that last for at least 12 hours once you break the glass vial and activate them.

I also have attached one to each Life Vest to increase visibility for each individual and the group.

That covers the basics for your ditch baq. To put all that in your bag cost a lot of money, and if you are like me you couldn't afford to do it all at once. That is OK, but start building your bag with the items that you have or can afford. You can add the hand held VHF or GPS or a big EPIRB later as you can afford to buy them. A life is worth every dollar you spend even if it stretches your budget!

OK, you have assembled your Ditch Baq, now what?

Like I said at the start of this article your baq should be ON-Deck when you leave the dock. You should then assign a primary person and a secondary backup person to be responsible, to make sure in an emergency, it goes over with them and does not get stuck in the boat!

requirements. If your vessel is missing any required item, you will receive detailed explanation of what is needed and how to correct it. The best part is that there isn't any consequence for failure to meet the requirements during a vessel safety check! No citations! No fines! No penalties! The whole goal is to help mariners make sure they know what they need to have to be safe on the water.

Once all the requirements have been met, you will be issued a Coast Guard Auxiliary decal to put on your vessel. This decal lets the Coast Guard and other law enforcement know that you have all the required safety equipment and meet all federal, state, and local laws. It is good for the calendar year in which it is issued and may qualify you for a discount on your insurance.

If you're interested in getting a vessel safety check on your boat, there are two easy ways to get in contact with a Coast Guard Auxiliary Vessel Examiner.

- 1. Email your contact and vessel information to cgauxjaxbch@gmail.com with the subject line stating "vessel safety check."
- 2. Click the link "Get a Vessel Safety Check" at www.cgaux.org. This will send your information to the nearest 5 vessel examiners.


Once we have your information, our vessel examiners will contact you to schedule a convenient time and location for your vessel safety check. We will come to you where ever your vessel is! The Auxiliary is authorized to inspect any recreational vessel up to 65 feet in length. Don't forget about your canoes, kayaks, and standup paddleboards; the Auxiliary can inspect those too!

The Coast Guard Auxiliary has also provided safe boating classes since its inception in 1939. The Auxiliary's purpose was, and it continues now, to improve safety on coastal and inland waterways for recreational boaters. In total, there are 17 different courses for students ranging from six years old all the way through adulthood. Subjects range from Boating Fun and Waypoints, About Boating Safely, and Boating or Sailing Skills and Seamanship. The Auxiliary also offers advanced courses in subjects such as Navigating with GPS, How to Read a Nautical Chart, and Suddenly in Command for the first mate who might find him or herself having to take command in the case of an emergency.

The slogan, "Safe Boating is NO Accident," encourages every boat skipper to become involved with the safe boating process by enrolling in one of theses classes, but it doesn't stop there. Safe boating is a family affair and together the learning process can not only provide the entire crew with valuable information, but becomes a fun and learning experience for all!

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Hypothermia

When the body loses heat faster than it can produce it.

<u>The Fatal Scenario.</u>

When the body's core temperature reaches: --- 96 degrees Fahrenheit, violent shivering begins.

--- 95 degrees Fahrenheit, rational thought stops.

--- 93.2 degrees Fahrenheit, consciousness becomes clouded.

--- 92 degrees Fahrenheit, memory loss, hallucinating.

--- 91.4 degrees Fahrenheit, shivering stops.

--- 90 degrees Fahrenheit, the person becomes unconscious.

--- 86 degrees Fahrenheit, death results from heart failure.

86 degrees Fahrenheit is the ambient temperature of a fairly hot summer day. It doesn't have to be freezing out to kill you!

As the weather turns colder, and since the Captain of a vessel is responsible for the safety of his/her vessel and the crew, all Captains should be giving some thought to the prevention of hypothermia. As a Captain, have you ever thought about what a life jacket has in common with a blanket relative to hypothermia and safety in boating? Both can save your life when you are facing a major killer in aquatic mishaps such as hypothermia. Hypothermia can pose a problem for members of the crew anytime of the year, but should be of greater concern to all Captains as we approach colder weather.

A life jacket, obviously, will keep you afloat, but can also help ward off hypothermia by trapping warmed water between it and your body. A blanket can help prevent hypothermia by reducing body heat loss. Most boaters do not have a full understanding of hypothermia and how it can impact them. Most people think of hypothermia as "freezing to death" or frost bite. Hypothermia occurs when the body loses heat faster than it can be replaced and can kill a person at temperatures well above freezing.

Hypothermia occurs most rapidly when your body is immersed in cold water but may occur at anytime especially in windy situations if your clothing is wet. It can also occur in water as warm as 80 degrees if you are exposed for a long period of time. In water at 50 degrees, the predicted time for survival is 1.5 to 3 hours. If you should fall overboard with a lifejacket on, do not exert yourself. Keep your arms at your side and your legs together to conserve heat. If you find yourself in the water without a lifejacket conserving heat is even more important since you will have to keep yourself afloat. Do not try to swim, but exert as little effort as possible to float until rescued.

A person's body burns food to give it energy and maintain its temperature. When your body cools, blood moves from the surface area to the vital organs and you burn stored food to generate heat. Shivering is the first sign that your body is telling you that its temperature is below normal and action is required to correct the situation. If nothing is done, your body

will begin a systematic shutdown. It is at this point; a blanket can be a lifesaver. A shivering person should be attended to immediately and dried if wet, removed from the wind and covered with a blanket and kept as warm as possible to conserve body heat.

If confronted with a hypothermic person, always remember that hypothermia is a serious medical problem. Make the person as comfortable as possible and seek medical help as soon as possible. If some distance from the shore, advise the Coast Guard by radio and they may send a medivac copter to remove the victim.

The best solution for hypothermia, however, is to prevent it by wearing protective gear, staying dry and out of the wind. Never go into a potentially hypothermic situation without having eaten a good meal.

FWC approves changes to spotted

Seatrout rules!

The following rules will go into effect Feb. 1, 2020:

- Reducing bag limits
 - Western Panhandle: five to three fish.
 - Big Bend: no change (remains five fish).
 - South Florida: four to three fish.
 - Central East: four to two fish.
 - Northeast: six to five fish.
- Modifying the recreational slot size limit from 15-to-20 inches to 15-to-19 inches total length.
- Allowing one seatrout over 19 inches per vessel (currently per harvester).
