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To Help Keep Us Out Of Trouble

I just spent a couple of hours going through the Fishing Regulations, both Florida and the SAFMC junk.

What I learned is that you need to take a college level class on the combined regulations to even begin to understand them.

What I can say for sure is that NOW if you are going to bottom fish you are required to use non-stainless steel, non-offset CIRCLE hooks, have an approved DE-HOOKING device, an <u>approved</u> MEASURING Device (The "Tape" molded in the top of a cooler = Citation) and an approved descending device on board.

You will also need a Florida Reef fishing permit. (Free, just go the the Florida Website to register. <u>https://myfwc.com/license</u>

You should also get or download the LATEST Florida Fishing Regulations and have them with you when you go fishing.

The FWC are good guys, but the rules change so often and fast, they may not know the latest change, and having the latest from their website might help avoid a citation!

I recently spoke with a fisherman that was stopped by the FWC Officers. They were nice to him and let him off with a warning as he had a 'Sharp Nose Shark' on board but was totally unaware that to keep it he had to have that Atlantic Highly Migratory Species <u>PERMIT</u>!

Did you know that you had to have that permit to keep or have on board any of the following species.:

Tunas, Billfishes, Swordfish, Sharks, Bluefin Tuna, Blue Marlin, White Marlin, Roundscale Spearfish, Sailfish, and Swordfish.

Also there are reporting requirements for most of these.

You can get your permit by going to the following website:

They are very inexpensive for the sport fishermen, but you definitely want to have yours while out there fishing!!!

Now for some of MY fishing Secrets

As I have said before in the newsletter, I got my degree in Oceanography which included minors in Marine fisheries, Marine Zoology, Marine Biology, and Wildlife Management. (I also like to hunt.)

Off Eureka California I was considered one of the top fisherman for Salmon, Albacore, and bottom fishing. That covers both trolling and bottom fishing.

Here is my first trick that increased my catch 10 fold.

I use to take a lot of 35mm photos, and had a lot of 35mm plastic film canisters. I take one of these (Any similar size plastic bottle will work.) and use a small nail I heat it up and melt a hole in the center of the bottom. Melting rather than drilling creates a hole with smooth edges so it does not cut or abrade the mono line I use.

I next put a short piece of mono tied around a bead through the hole from the inside, and tie the other end to a snap swivel so there is about 2" of line from the snap swivel to the bottom of the bottle. You can drill or melt about 6 or so holes in the sides of the bottle, make them a $\frac{1}{4}$ inch or smaller.

Now cut an open cell sponge or foam to fit in the bottle and SOAK it in any of the fish oils. I liked the "Smelly Jelly" brand as it lasted for about an hour before I would replenish it. Very sticky.

Clip that rig to your trolling weight or line in front of the lure. It leaves a trail of scent that covers the bait as you troll. It really does work.

I also clip one to my bottom weight so it leaks fish oil out on the bottom where your bait is near.

A trail or scent of fish oil is another "CLUE" that predator fish see as a wounded fish and easy prey. They zero in on that trail quickly.

I also put a fish oil soaked foam piece in my little squid that I usually have just in front of my bait so it looks like the bait / lure is after it. Again, not paying attention and easier prey. I also want to remind you that fish only have enough brain to cover three things, 1- to eat, 2 - to avoid being eaten, and 3 - to reproduce. They don't look at something and think "Hummmm that looks wrong, I won't eat it." They don't notice your leader at all.

To a predator fish, ANY disturbance in the water is a FEEDING FRENZY. **Big Hint here** . . . Your Boat is a disturbance in the water! Try to make it plow through the water, tilt the motor up some so it pushes your bow up and makes as much wake and bubbles as you can.

Don't troll your lures too far back! The short lures / lines should be just on the outside edge of the bubbles at the 3rd wave back. (They are appear to be stragglers and easy prey to a predator.) the outside Long lines should be again just on the outside of where your wake bubbles are starting to clear up and your "Way Back" should be no more than 5 yards behind the last of your bubble trail.

No, the boat will not scare off the fish, I have had them take the bait right at the transom as I was putting it in!

In California the hard core Captains put decals or wraps of SQUID on the bottom of their boat. They can feel and hear the fish hitting the bottom of their boat!

Before I go out, I look at the sea surface temperatures and look for a temperature break of at least 1 degree or better break. If it is near structure all the better, but structure is not necessary for me.

I troll on the higher temperature side of the temperature break, and try to follow that break against the current. I troll just about 7 to 10 yards on the warmer side, or if there is murky green water and clear blue water I troll just on the clear side. The predators like to hide in the less clear water and ambush the bait on the clear side.

Don't worry if your bait / lures are not deep, the predators will come up from as deep as 100 ' to hit something on the surface!

With that in mind, we really would like to hear from you the members, just what we can do to make it better, to encourage more participation at the meetings, and or other activities that you would like to see us participate in or do.


The Board might not decide to go along with all your ideas, but they definitely would like to hear from you.

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With the winter months upon us, the water temperature will be critical to catching the various species of fish that we target.

Below is a chart of the preferred water temperature for the various species. IT has a lower avoidance, preferred range and upper avoidance temperatures. This does not mean that you won't find an occasional fish outside of its lower or upper range, but if you are going to target a species, you will have better luck finding them in their preferred range.

Don't forget that just because your bottom finder shows 70 degrees at the surface that there might be a thermocline making it a lot cooler on the bottom. I carry a cheap thermometer that I lower to check the bottom temp if my weight feels cool when I bring it up.

Your Knot for November

The Surgeons End Loop

This is a very easy and strong knot that lets you put a loop in the end of your line.

1 - Double about 10" of line.



2 - Make a simple overhand loop, passing the line through the loop 2 or 3 times.



3 - Wet the line to lubricate it (Spit works best.) and pull it tight.


