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NEW FLOUNDER

REGULATIONS ARE EFFECTIVE MARCH 1

Starting March 1, the following changes will go into effect for flounder:

- Extending ALL Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission(FWC) flounder regulations into federal waters.
- Increasing the minimum size limit from 12 inches to 14 inches total length (recreational and commercial).
- Reducing the recreational daily bag limit from 10 to five fish per person.
- Establishing an Oct. 15 through Nov. 30 recreational closed season.
- For commercial harvesters using allowable gear: Establishing a commercial trip and vessel limit of 150 fish from Dec. 1 - Oct. 14, and 50 fish from Oct. 15 - Nov. 30.
- Modifying the incidental bycatch limit for commercial harvesters using non-allowable gear from 50 pounds/trip to 50 fish/trip.
- Creating a federal waters trawl bycatch limit of 150 fish/trip from Dec. 1 - Oct. 14, and 50 fish/trip from Oct. 15 - Nov. 30.

The Commission approved these changes at its December 2020 meeting because a stock status update suggested that the flounder fishery statewide has been in a general declining trend and is likely overfished and undergoing overfishing on the Atlantic coast of Florida. Other south Atlantic and Gulf states have also reported declines in flounder populations and have been making their own regulation changes.


So, what's up with the Fishing. on the Wahoo front, Vamoose landed a 101# Wahoo big fish!! A lot of boats with great catches I would say that Wahoo season is in full swing. Black fin tuna should be around. My go to is a cedar plug. Sailfish will be around the reefs rig a naked Ballyhoo 100# mono pull around 8kn with a teaser in front. On the bottom Grouper are closed look for Porgy, B-liner and Trigger around 120ft and out I like to use a double hook rig. Sea Bass will be available if you don't want to run far offshore.

Inshore. Redfish should be good on the falling tide, at the rock's Trout on a float rig with a shrimp or jig. Sheepshead use a jig and fiddler crab or clam. Black Drum will be in deep water at the end of the rocks $\frac{1}{4}$ blue crab on a fish finder rig or 3-way swivel make sure it on the bottom. Watch the weather Be Safe. Singe up for the club tournaments see you on the water.

This months knot is one that I use a lot for bottom fishing. In my "HOW TO (Maybe) CATCH FISH" article else where in this Reel News, This is what I like to use.

The Dropper Loop

I am going to describe how to tie this so read it carefully. This is a Mono or Fluorocarbon knot.


First make a big loop in your line, about 4" to 5" in diameter.

Wrap the tag end of your line around through the loop 7 times.

Now you will have your loop with the 7 twist on one side. In the center of the loops, 3 from each end, separate the lines to make an opening in the middle.

Take the opposite side of the loop and pull it through the opening as far as it will go.

Wet, lubricate, spit on the lines and pull the two ends tight.





OK, it is time to talk about Safety again!

Lets start with your next fishing trip. I am assuming that you have your boat in good condition, good hoses, clamps, drain plug, everything recently checked.

FIRST thing, fill out your FLOAT PLAN! (www.jaxfish.com - "Fishing Info" - "Links" -"JOSFC Courtesy Float Plan". Great idea, DOWNLOAD that file, fill out all the information that does not change, then SCAN it and print out several copies for future use!)

NOW, lets assume that you ARE going to capsize or sink! Are you ready for this emergency? Is your DITCH BAG up to date with current flares? A hand held VHF radio (Its batteries charged or fresh?) a PLB (Personal Locator Beacon.) Isn't your and your crews life worth about \$200? Some water for a day or two?

You should refer to the January 2020 Reel News (There are 14 YEARS of the REEL NEWS at www.jaxfish.com - "General Info" -"Reel News Newsletter" for you to read or go back to find an article.) The January issue has a whole list of recommended and suggested things to have in your ditch bag.

HAVE YOUR DITCH BAG ON DECK SO IT IS AVAILABLE IN AN INSTANT AND NOT LOCKED BELOW DECK WHEN THE BOAT TURNS TURTLE SUDDENLY!

Everyone has a life jacket either on or right at hand, NOT zipped in a bag attached to the 'T' top.

Remember you really should wear your life jackets AT LEAST WHILE THE BOAT IS UNDERWAY!

Before you left the dock you did give your crew the Safety Tour, right? You made sure that EVERYONE knew how to operate the boat, reconnect the kill switch if you go down or it gets pulled, start the engine, work the radio and change channel to channel 16. (Emergency channel) to read the GPS and give your location, what is in the Ditch Bag and to make sure it goes with everyone if the boat aoes down.

Lets talk about a First Aid kit. Have a small one in the ditch bag, but I also recommend putting a complete one together in one of these Orange plastic water proof Ammo Boxes you can get at most of the outdoor stores.

You should always cary a good First Aid kit as you are fishing, include a good heavy duty pair of wire or bolt cutters, sturdy enough to cut the heaviest fish hooks you use or have on board. Don't just get a little plastic Walmart First Aid Kit, you need to assemble a good kit. Just think of some of the injuries you could see.

Cuts down to the bone, hooks through the hand, broken bones from falls on a slippery deck. Kingfish, Wahoo, Barracuda, Sharks and all kinds of fish here have a mouth FULL of big sharp teeth! (That is why on my boat I don't recommend sandals, flip flops or bare feet.)

You need plenty of gauze pads, Gauze wraps, Anti-biotic spray, cream, and something to wash the wound with like fresh water or a sterile saline wash.

A friend that is a Doctor said he does not like Hydrogen Peroxide as while it does sterilize the wound and area it also actually kills some of your cells on the exposed surface of the wound and delays healing and makes bigger scars.

Here is something you would not think of for a first aid kit, but how about a roll of good

cloth backed Duct Tape? It is good for temporary splints as well making a waterproof wraps over wounds and lots of other temporary repairs around the boat.

How about an Eye Wash? People do get suntan spray or lotion in their eyes and who knows what else.

Do you cary a couple of those Emergency Blankets to use in case someone needs to get warm or to prevent shock?

Ok. don't forget the little stuff like band-aids for little cuts, Aspirin (The quick dissolve powder in case of heart attack. Also some Tylenol or Motrin for those people that can't take Aspirin. Sunscreen for those fools that forget theirs! There are a couple out there that can be applied while the person is wet.

HOW TO (Maybe) CATCH FISH

Here is what I learned from a charter Captain over 50 years ago, and has been my standard as it always made sense to me. Oh, it also works well!

For starters I like to use the kevlar type braids for my main line. They are super thin for their test weight and stronger than steel! On my Pen 30 wides Lever drags I can spool 700 yards of 80 pound test SpiderWire blue Big Water Braid! I use the same rod & reel combo for both bottom fishing and trolling.

I tie a high quality snap swivel to the end of my braid, and then use a mono or fluorocarbon leader for my hooks and weight.

I set my drag to about half the breaking weight of my leader and like to be able to bring it up to $\frac{3}{4}$ of the breaking strength if necessary with the lever drag.

I always use a lighter leader so that when (Not if, but WHEN.) I snag the bottom with either my hook or weight, I don't lose any of my main line.

Now here is the nice part, I have a "RIG" bag with several leaders already tied up with a swivel at the top to hook to my main line's snap swivel, then either 1 or 2 dropper loops (Hint, Space your dropper loops far enough apart that the hooks do not catch each other instead of

while the be is underway! Did you buy that extra 5Lb Fire Extinguisher



How to Continued sitting out there for the fish.) and another snap swivel at the bottom so I can hook whatever weight I need on the end of the line.

You can attach your hook directly to the Dropper Loop or if you are using live bait put your hook on a 1' or 2' leader that is attached to the dropper loop.


I like to use BIG jig heads (6 oz) with a big chunk of bait on it for my bottom weight. Just in case that big fish comes along.

I also will use the "Fish Finder" setup with some standard additions to it over the original setup.

The "Fish Finder" is a leader at the end of my main line (Same as above.) but you have a sliding weight on the swivel and a single hook at the end of the line.

Here are some hints to improve your setup and make changes quicker.

Often you will find that the current suddenly picks up and you need a heaver weight to stay on the bottom. Use a weight slider (A tube that fits over your line with a snap on the side of the tube.) This makes it quick and easy to change your weight.



The idea of the Fish Finder rig is that you bait is floating or swimming out there freely and the big fish can pick it up with out feeling the weight, so they will swallow your bait and the circle hook then pulls out to the corner of it mouth and gets hooked better.

One last thing I learned here (The hard way.) when you are trolling near shore when the Spanish mackerel are running, use BLACK swivels, the silver ones get hit by the Spanish and cut off quick as you can get them in the water!

Here is some info you can use if you are fishing the El Cheapo!

AS you know we have tides that run about 4.5 feet from low to high. (Don't get stranded on a sandbar by going up a creek on the outgoing tide!) and the tides run in a cycle that has a High tide that is higher and a high tide that is lower, the same for the lows, one is lower than the other low tide.

Well for the El Cheapo,

dock we have high LOW TIDE of
.14 feet at 8:28 AM and it will
be an INCOMING tide to a low
HIGH TIDE of 3.79 feet at
2:38 PM.

Also do NOT FORGET that you must be IN THE LINE for weigh-in no later than 4:00 PM (Not running up from the dock, but standing in line!)

Another reminder to everyone, IF you are fishing offshore (Anytime, not just for the tournament.) you must have a "State Reef Fish Angler" permit added to your license. IT is FREE!
