Happy New Year! I hope everyone had a Merry Christmas and received all the toys they were wishing for.


I feel like this year is going to be a great one and we are all going to have fun in the club activities and catch a lot of quality fish.

Welcome to 2007! This month should bring continued good fishing, especially if the wind will ever stop. All of the inshore fish haven's should be holding Sea Bass, Snapper and Grouper. Places like FA, FB, NM, MG, PG/PM (North Barge Loran 45173.3 61963.7 GPS Lat 30 20.219 Lon 081 11.028) and RL would be great places to look. If you make it further offshore, to BR or CH, you should find Vermillion Snapper plentiful. My sources tell me that Kingfish can be caught this time of the year if you make it out to the Elton bottom. Out at the ledge there should be Wahoo but not in the numbers that we will see in just a few weeks.

In the river and at the jetties, the Sheepshead should be here in very good numbers. Trout should also be caught in good numbers. Remember that Spotted Sea Trout season will close on the 1st of February and remain closed until the 1st of March. Deep holes in the river and the ICW should yield fish using a sliding bobber rig with live shrimp or a Berkley Gulp on a jig head. Check with our associate member bait stores for colors and sizes. Good luck and have a prosperous New Year.

Getting the Hooks In!

Would you consider going one for seven successful? Would a mere forty pound fish satisfy your desire? It was at dinner the other night that I realized how much fishing imitates life. I listened to my wife's friend Dave and her converse about ex-wife's and ex-husbands and then it hit me. Our day of Wahoo fishing so much reflects certain aspects of all of our lives. 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Top's Típs Safety Fírst

As the weather turns colder, and since the Captain of a vessel is responsible for the safety of his/her vessel and the crew, all Captains should be giving some thought to the prevention of hypothermia. As a Captain, have you ever thought about what a life jacket has in common with a blanket relative to hypothermia and safety in boating? Both can save your life when you are facing a major killer in aquatic mishaps such as hypothermia. Hypothermia can pose a problem for members of the crew anytime of the year, but should be of greater concern to all Captains as we approach colder weather.

A life jacket, obviously, will keep you afloat, but can also help ward off hypothermia by trapping warmed water between it and your body. A blanket can help prevent hypothermia by reducing body heat loss. Most boaters do not have a full understanding of hypothermia and how it can impact them. Most people think of hypothermia as "freezing to death" or frost bite. Hypothermia occurs when the body loses heat faster than it can be replaced and can kill a person at temperatures well above freezing.

Hypothermia occurs most rapidly when your body is immersed in cold water but may occur at anytime especially in windy situations if your clothing is wet. It can also occur in water as warm as 80 degrees if you are exposed for a long period of time. In water at 50 degrees, the predicted time for survival is 1.5 to 3 hours. If you should fall overboard with a lifejacket on, do not exert yourself. Keep your arms at your side and your legs together to conserve heat. If you find yourself in the water without a lifejacket conserving heat is even more important since you will have to keep yourself afloat. Do not try to swim, but exert as little effort as possible to float until rescued.

A person's body burns food to give it energy and maintain its temperature. When your body cools, blood moves from the surface area to the vital organs and you burn stored food to generate heat. Shivering is the first sign that your body is telling you that its temperature is below normal and action is required to correct the situation. If nothing is done, your body will begin a systematic shutdown. It is at this point; a blanket can be a lifesaver. A shivering person should be attended to immediately and dried if wet, removed from the wind and covered with a blanket and kept as warm as possible to conserve body heat.

If confronted with a hypothermic person, always remember that hypothermia is a serious medical problem. Make the person as comfortable as possible and seek medical help as soon as possible. If some distance from the shore, advise the Coast Guard by radio and they may send a medivac copter to remove the victim. The best solution for hypothermia, however, is to prevent it by wearing protective gear, staying dry and out of the wind. Never go into a potentially hypothermic situation without having eaten a good meal.

May you continue to enjoy safe boating throughout the year.

Hypothermia - *When the body loses heat faster than it can produce it.*

The Fatal Scenario.

When the body's core temperature reaches:

--- 96 degrees Fahrenheit, violent shivering begins.

--- 95 degrees Fahrenheit, rational thought stops.

--- 93.2 degrees Fahrenheit, consciousness becomes clouded.

--- 92 degrees Fahrenheit, memory loss, hallucinating.

--- 91.4 degrees Fahrenheit, shivering stops. --- 90 degrees Fahrenheit, the person becomes unconscious.

--- 86 degrees Fahrenheit, death results from heart failure.

86 degrees Fahrenheit is the ambient temperature of a fairly hot summer day.

It doesn't have to be freezing out to kill you !

Dirty Rice or Cajun Rice

2 Cups of white long grain rice
¹/₂ Cup of chopped seasoning (onions peppers garlic celery)
1 Cup of Boiled & Chopped Chicken Livers or Ground Turkey if you don't like liver
1 Cup of Chopped Shrimp
¹/₄ Stick of butter
1 Tbs of olive oil
³/₄ cup water
Tony Chachere's Original Creole Seasoning

Cook rice is separate pot.

Place butter, olive oil and chopped seasoning in a large saucepan. Cook until brown then add chicken live or turkey, let it brown then add water. It should look like mud.
