TIC TOCK, BIOMASS CLOCK

Tic tock, tic tock is the sound of the biomass clock. Times are a changing and so is our fishing thus I had to go and target something else completely different. As a fisherman in NE Florida, I use to go and try my hand at catching a Red Snapper or two but now those days are long gone so it's now fishing for that hard to find White Grunt. Yes, it's a fish of little known quality as a sports fish but never-the-less a sports fish is a sports fish, right? As the winter winds howls, it has keep the newly revamp grunt fishing fleet in port; however, last weekend saw Ol'Man Winter catch his breath and let up on the wind.

It was nice to feel the cold wind rush against my ears as the mighty *Let's Go* knifed through the sea and air on its way out to our spot. The destination was a mere twenty-five plus miles offshore to trophy size fishing grounds of the White Grunt. Our boat anchored in 103 foot of water on a little known number given to me by the Sheppard of the Seas, Capt George Strate. As usually, the bottom scope lit up with a great red mass indicating an abundance of fish gathered around a bottom structure. Since this was January, each of us secretly prayed that we would not have a monster grouper or one of those mythical, hard to find Genuine Red Snapper eat our White Grunt on the way up to the surface.

Anchoring was a breeze since the big red biomass mark on the depth finder was located straight under the boat. As with fishing for either snapper or grouper, the big beef sticks were taken out because we had to be ready just in case any of these fish choose to eat our baits. As for finding that four pound White Grunt, I guess we were cursed because our fishing day did not work out for us. Unfortunately, we were plagued by a few grouper which had to be released, what came next was truly unexpected. It just so happened to work out that this one tiny spot in the entire South Atlantic held the remaining biomass of Red Snapper. We could not get our baits resting on the bottom long enough to target our 4 pound White Grunt before one of those pesky Genuine Red Snapper snapped our bait up. It was an exercise in futility because just as fast as we found our bait on the bottom a Red Snapper was coming up. In fact, when we did have a grunt on, the grouper gobbled them up as well leaving us with very little for the fish box.

As I stood there on the deck of my boat surveying the ocean contemplating life, it hit me like a ton of bricks. I guess Ol' Roy Crabtree was right after all. I was so wrong at all those SAFMC scoping meeting where I ceaselessly campaigned about just how wrong their economic data was. I was here fishing just like our wise government leaders said I would be. Who would have thought I would have paid \$20 in

gas for fuel for the suburban, \$12 in ice for the food and fish cooler, \$35 for oil, \$40 for bait and \$100 in gas all just to catch a trophy grunt. Oh man, I forgot the \$9 for lunch material and another lets say \$20 for fishing supplies such has leaders, sinkers and hooks. But here, I stood fishing away for my trophy 4 pound White Grunt. Like the Great Buddha passing out enlightenment cards, I had been dealt a full house. With three other anglers on board and all of us trying to capture a trophy grunt plus the Red Snapper not relenting, I came around to understand just how the SAFMC developed their mortality figure. We must have caught just over fifty or so snapper. They were right! My God of Kindness and Enlightenment, the Council was right! Of the Red Snapper we caught, exactly 40% of them died. If I am lying then I am, well you know the phrase. It was a true stunner to see so so many Red Snapper floating way from our anchored boat. Just how could I be so wrong for so long is what I was asking myself?

With all of those snapper floating behind the boat was a sight to behold and after four and a half hours of fishing all that dead fish acted just like a glorified chum slick. Its hard to image a chum slick made up of several 5 pound snapper plus a few teenage snappers and one or two twenty pound sows mixed in but they floated off none the-less. Now cue the Jaws theme music because it was working up our chum line. Yes, in recent years, Jaws has become a more frequent visitor to our shore. Today was our turn to spy this beast. Honestly, the mere sight of a Great White shark, you emote so many a different emotions that it is truly hard to say which one wins. Although, fear and awe are the two that tend to peak when viewing this creature.

If the Boy Scouts ever taught me anything it was to always be prepared. But just how does one prepare for a Great White? Well, a 16' hook and 400 pound cable leader pre crimped is a good way to be prepared. One thing about big sharks like the Great White is that they are lazy feeders. Instead of chasing one of the many or few remaining Red Snapper coming off the bottom, it preferred to snack on one of the several 40%'ers floating on the surface. That snapper came of the side of the boat and dehooked itself upon landing on the deck. (It is here where my therapist suggested I had a slight anger management problem.) I grabbed the wooden fish bat reserved for sharks & catfish and I began to way-lay upon the fish. Others heard me proclaim, "take that Roy" or "40% mortality, \$@!!. How 'bout 100% mortality now". (This was a dark period for me so please excuse the outburst) With one eye dangling and blood leaking from its gills, I knew this would be hard for the Great White to resist.

The 16' hook was plunged through the half dead snapper and it was tossed into the chum slick. The great grey fish sensed the snapper quiver in the chum slick because its motions quickened. It turned crisply toward the floundering fish and with one great gulp, it inhaled the 13 pound snapper. With a mouth as wide as any trash can, the bait snapper simply disappeared. Not even those coal black eyes blinked as the hook found its mark inside that fleshy mouth.

Light tackle fishing for Great Whites is a tall task because all I had to battle with watery demon was a 30 wide and forty pound test. The first run was second to none. A large

Subj: Polk County Boating Fatality

On 12/18/2009 at approximately 7:30 p.m., a Winter Haven couple were fishing on the east side of Lake Howard when their 12 foot vessel capsized. The husband last saw his 66-year-old wife holding onto a throwable life jacket before losing sight of her. The victim's body was recovered a short time later by rescuers with no signs of life.

WEAR YOUR LIFE JACKET

The 10th Annual El Cheapo Sheepshead Tournament, to be held on February 27, presents an excellent opportunity to remind the Club membership of the fact that the successful fishing/boating trip is the one that begins and ends safely. One way to ensure a safe outing on the water is to wear your life jacket. Although not required by law, except for children 13 years of age and younger, boaters should wear a life jacket especially when the boat is underway. Historical data shows that many excellent swimmers have drowned when thrown from a moving boat without wearing a flotation device of some type. Recently we had a near tragic accident when a small boat, with 3 fishermen, capsized near the jetties. Since the fishermen were not wearing life jackets, only the quick action of some nearby fishermen prevented a tragedy.

As a practical matter, I know that many of you will not wear your life jacket. If the life jacket is not worn, however, it should be at least readily accessible and available for immediate donning in an emergency such as a vessel sinking, fire, etc. One place it would be readily available is draped over the helm seat back. Please keep in mind that a life jacket will be of no help to you if you are thrown from the boat without the life jacket on. A life jacket should not be stowed in a closed or locked compartment, or have other gear stowed on top of it.

If your boat is 16 feet or longer, you must have a throwable floatation device in addition to wearable ones for each person on board the vessel. The throwable device must be immediately available near the helm and all persons on board should be informed of its position and use. All recreational boats must carry one type 1, 2, 3, or 5 floatation device for each person

on board. Any boat 16 feet or over, except canoes and kayaks, must also carry one type 4 (throwable) device.

Most recreational boaters elect to carry the type 3 floatation device which is designed to keep the wearer vertical in the water and where quick rescue is probable, The type 2 floatation device, or near shore buoyant vest, is designed to turn a person to a vertical position in the water, but not as pronounced as the type1.

The type 1 floatation device is designed to turn an unconscious person from face down to a vertical position and is used by boaters cruising waters where there is a probability of a delayed rescue. The type 5 floatation device, or flotation suit, provides not only flotation, but also protection from hypothermia and is intended for special; use activities. No matter what type of lifejacket you carry on your vessel, it will only work when worn.

Make it a point to at least wear your life jacket when running from one spot to another. If you encounter a rouge wake or wave and are thrown from the boat your chances of survival are increased. Wear your life jacket and continue to enjoy safe boating throughout the year.

Wahoo would be envious on the distance of the run and a sailfish would have shaken its head in shame over the speed that this 16 foot fish reached. It only took one great big chomp and the cable was shredded freeing the massive shark.

With little wasted motion or energy, the *Let's Go* was made ready and headed home. Amazed at nature's awesome power, we now had a story for a lifetime of telling. However, upon inspection of the fish box at the dock, we noticed we failed to accumulate any 4 pound trophy size White Grunts. I guess we need to venture out once more to do this all over again. What would Ol' Crabtree say echoed in my head with all those dead snapper sacrificed to the sake of a trophy grunt. With nothing to show and our heads held low, we wondered just how we could face our fellow fisherman on the Club's front porch.

FYI

The Fishing Boards...... For all the new members and any one that wants to win one or go for Captain of the Year.

When you catch a fish that is bigger (Bigger by ½ Pound) than a fish that is currently on a board, or that slot is empty, and you have weighed it on a certified scale, you submit a Fish Slip (Found in the rack to the right of the door as you come in.) For each fish you get on a board you get a Club \$5.00 certificate, that can be spent at several local bait & tackle stores or for club the raffle or club merchandise.

At the end of September, **IF** you have the most fish on a board, **AND** have participated in **3** of the Club Tournaments, either as a Captain, Crew, or for 1 of the 3, helped Run the Tournament at the Club house, you win that Board.

Remember, any one can knock you off a board with a bigger fish, and you can knock them off by catching another bigger fish.

The Bluewater and Unlimited Boards are for fish caught outside the Eastern boundary of our Chart, out to 100 Miles, and within the North / South limits of our Chart. The rest of the boards are for fish caught within the limits of our chart.

The Light Tackle board is for Fish caught on 8 Pound Test line, and a 10 foot sample of the line must be submitted with the Fish Slip. It must break at no more than 8.8 Pounds.

All these RULES are detailed in the yellow Fishing & Tournament Rules booklet found in the rack by the door.


