The Florida Saltwater Fishing Panel

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission considers it essential to gather scientific information concerning the behaviors, attitudes, and preferences of licensed saltwater anglers in Florida. The Florida Saltwater Fishing Panel (FSFP) is a new approach being used by the Commission to gather social science information from and about anglers on a continuing basis. This information, along with the results of biological research, will provide important insight into fisheries management and policy decisions.

FSFP members are surveyed once a month concerning the number of days they went saltwater fishing, hours of effort, catch rates, the origins and destinations of their latest fishing trips, and the money spent on those trips. Each month members of the panel will also be asked questions about current and

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emerging fisheries management and policy-related issues.

These data will be used to estimate effort and catch rates, develop models for the economic impacts and value of saltwater fishing, and better understand anglers' attitudes on a range of subjects, including proposed regulations and policies. The findings from FSFP surveys will be posted regularly on this website.

Two methods will be used to recruit licensed saltwater anglers to register for the FSFP: 1) Invitation letters sent to a stratified, proportional (e.g., by location of residences, by types of licenses) sample of license holders and 2) recruitment through sport fishing organizations and media, charter boat captains, and word-of-mouth promotion.

The data from the FSFP surveys will be weighted to be representative of the distribution of licensed Florida saltwater anglers.

Top's Tips Safety First

FUELING

After hearing, recently, about a boat that exploded and burned at the dock in Delray Harbor, I thought it was time to remind everyone about the need to be extra careful when fueling your vessel. On January 3, 2011, at about 4:21 pm, a 34 foot Tollycraft had just finished fueling at the Delray Harbor Marina when dock attendants noticed fuel had been spilled into the water. The dock attendants had started a process of a clean up and the dock master had advised the vessel's Captain against starting the engines. Two people were on the bridge and one person was below deck when an explosion occurred. The two people on the bridge received second degree burns and the person below deck died as a result of the explosion. An investigation is under way, but the exact cause of the explosion has not been determined to date. Although it is more dangerous when fueling an inboard versus an outboard, all can be hazardous to your health if proper safety procedures are not followed.

Before fueling, shut off your engines and all electrical appliances that may create a spark.

Remember, if you spill fuel in the water when you are fueling your vessel, make sure all the fuel and vapors are cleared before you start your engines. The same applies if you spill fuel in the bilge of your boat. If you are fueling an outboard with portable tanks, always remove the tanks from the boat and fuel them on the dock. If you should smell fuel, do not start your engines until the source of the smell has been determined and eliminated.

Also, to ensure that your boating/fishing trip is one that begins and ends safely, take the necessary steps in advance to make sure you do not run out of fuel offshore. Always check to make sure your fuel tank is full before starting a trip offshore. It will not only guard against you running out of fuel, but will also help reduce condensation in your fuel tank. When a partially empty fuel tank cools, some of the water vapor in the air condenses. Thus, when you leave your tank partially empty, you will slowly accumulate water which could cause more problems later.

As some of you may already know, it's a horrible feeling to look at an empty fuel gauge after your motor sputters and quits. Keeping a full tank is one way to safeguard against this. Another safeguard is to follow the "one-third rule". This rule says use only one-third of your fuel on your trip out to sea, use one-third on the way back and save-one third for reserve.

Why this formula? Why not use one-half out and one-half back? The reason being that the trip back may take more fuel than the trip out. When you go out, the wind and seas may be calm or from astern which would cause you to use less fuel

than normal. When you turn around and head back home, you may find yourself now heading into a strong head wind and heavy seas which will cause you to use much more fuel than normal. Forward progress can be slow and fuel consumption high, which could cause you to run out of fuel.

If you start with a full tank, and if you use the onethird rule, you should never have to worry about running out of fuel. Before filling your fuel tank, make sure the engine is shut down and all electrical devices such as fans, navigational devices, radios, motors, generators and lights have been turned off.

To be on the safe side, if an inboard, operate your engine compartment blower for at least five minutes after fueling, and anytime you start the engine. In order to make sure your blower is venting the compartment properly, do not rely on the noise of the motor running, but instead put your hand over the vent to make sure air is exiting the vent. Many times insects will build nest in, and block the vent, so that the only way to know if the vent is working is to put your hand over it to test for air movement. Then, before starting your engine, use the best instrument you have for checking for gas fumes, your mark eight nose to check all compartments for gas fumes by sniffing for odors. Follow these rules and continue to enjoy safe boating throughout the year. Top Ingram Fish Tales

SAFMC Battle Ground Recent closures and actions

- All grouper are closed Jan April Spawning Season Closure
- Vermillion Snapper are closed Nov March
- Sea Bass is now closed till June 1st, 2011
- Red Snapper is closed indefinitely
- Speckled hind and warsaw grouper are now closed indefinitely
- Closed snowy grouper, blueline tilefish, yellowedge grouper, misty grouper, queen snapper, and silk snapper, beyond 240 feet (73 m) in federal waters of the South Atlantic.
- We came close to having an area closure from 98 feet out to 240 for all bottom fishing.

What has been the cost of these closures?

- \$9.6 Billion -Recreational saltwater fishery economic impact (2008)
- 89,600 jobs are supported by the same industry (2008)
- \$5.6 Billion Commercial in-state sales
