Weather and fishing conditions were challenging to say the least with 20 knot North winds most of the morning. As the skies cleared and the wind subsided, fishing evidently improved as 183 Sheepshead were brought to the scales in both categories. Claiming top honors in the general division was Steven Austin of Jacksonville. Steve brought in a 10.1 lb. fish and took home a beautiful 2012 Carolina Skiff JVX18 center console boat with a 75 hp Mercury motor along with a number of other prizes. Scott Spivey took 2nd place with a 10.0 lb. fish netting him an Arctic Cat 450 ATV. 3rd place though 20th place received cash and merchandise payouts.

1st place Junior Angler winner David Dry hauled in a 8.3 lb. Sheepshead winning him a rod & reel combo, hand held GPS, gift cards from In River or Ocean, Academy Sports, West Marine, a pair of Ocean Waves Sunglasses, an etched glass trophy, and numerous other prizes. Junior Anglers were awarded through 15th place.

You probably already failed! That is NOT a good thing. Can you answer these questions without looking up some of the answers?

- 1 Did you leave a FLOAT PLAN with someone, or on the dash of your tow vehicle?
- 2 What date was your single, woefully too small, fire extinguisher last checked? Is it current, or has it been sitting in it's holder for the last 2+ years with all the dry chemical compacted and hard at the bottom? Do you have a big enough Fire Extinguisher? They are cheep, why not have two or three on board?
 - 3 What is the expiration date on your **Flares**?
- 4 Is your ditch bag sitting out where it will be available and have an EEPER attached to it?
- 6 Do you even have an EEPER? Why NOT? They are just a couple of hundred now! Isn't your life and your crews life worth that little money? Are it's Batteries good? They should be replaced every 5 years!
- 7 Does your ditch bag have enough water for everyone for a couple days?
- 8 What year did you last replace the batteries in your hand held VHF radio? Is it IN your Ditch Bag? The same thing for your hand held GPS?
 - 9 Where is your hand operated bailing device?
- 10 Does your hand held air horn work? What you don't have one?

Top's Tips Safety First

FUELING

A check with local towing services indicates that one of their most often calls is for fuel when a boat runs out of fuel on the way back from a fishing trip offshore. If you use the "1/3rd rule"; use only 1/3rd on the way out, 1/3rd on the way back and save 1/3rd for reserve, you should never run out of fuel. When we think of fuel, or fueling, we normally think of the consumption of fuel. However, one thing we should always think about and be prepared for is fire on board when fueling the boat. There have been numerous occasions when boaters have become careless when fueling and wind up with a boat on fire. Although it is more dangerous when fueling an inboard versus an outboard, all can be hazardous to your health if proper safety procedures are not followed.

Before fueling, shut off your engines and all electrical appliances that may create a spark.

Remember, if you spill fuel in the water when you are fueling your vessel, make sure all the fuel and vapors are cleared before you start your engines. The same applies if you spill fuel in the bilge of your boat. If you are fueling an outboard with portable tanks, always remove the tanks from the boat and fuel them on the dock. If you should smell fuel, do not start your engines until the source of the smell has been determined and eliminated.

Also, to ensure that your boating / fishing trip is one that begins and ends safely, take the necessary steps in advance to make sure you do not run out of fuel offshore. Always check to make sure your fuel tank is full before starting a trip offshore. It will not only guard against you running out of fuel, but will also help reduce condensation in your fuel tank. When a partially empty fuel tank cools, some of the water vapor in the air condenses. Thus, when you leave your tank partially empty, you will slowly accumulate water, which could cause more problems later.

As some of you may already know, it's a horrible feeling to look at an empty fuel gauge after your motor sputters and quits. Keeping a full tank is one way to safeguard against this. Another safeguard is to follow the "one-third rule" mentioned above. This rule says use only one-third of your fuel on your trip out to sea, use one-third on the way back and save-one third for reserve.

Why this formula? Why not use one-half out and one-half back? The reason being that the trip back may take more fuel than the trip out. When you go out, the wind and seas may be calm or from astern which would cause you to use less fuel than normal. When you turn around and head back home, you may find yourself now heading into a strong head wind and heavy seas which will cause you to use much more fuel than

normal. Forward progress can be slow and fuel consumption high, which could cause you to run out of fuel.

If you start with a full tank, and if you use the onethird rule, you should never have to worry about running out of fuel. Before filling your fuel tank, make sure the engine is shut down and all electrical devices such as fans, navigational devices, radios, motors, generators and lights have been turned off.

To be on the safe side, if an inboard, operate your engine compartment blower for at least five minutes after fueling, and anytime you start the engine. In order to make sure your blower is venting the compartment properly, do not rely on the noise of the motor running, but instead put your hand over the vent to make sure air is exiting the vent. Many times insects will build nest in, and block the vent, so that the only way to know if the vent is working is to put your hand over it to test for air movement. Then, before starting your engine, use the best instrument you have for checking for gas fumes, your mark eight nose to check all compartments for gas fumes by sniffing for odors. Follow these rules and continue to enjoy safe boating throughout the year.

- 13 Is the "O" ring on your drain plug old and brittle?
- 14 First aid kit current? How long ago did your first aid kit perishables expire? Yes Iodine expires! Here is something to think about. A lot of the (Other guys, not me) members are getting older. Does your first aid kit have some of the new crystalized Aspirin to dissolve under the tongue in case of a heart attack? (My Son was only 34)
- 15 Tested your VHF, or better yet upgraded to a new one with the DCS position sending feature?
- 16 Checked all your hose fittings are tight, and no corroded Electrical connections?
- 17 Your bilge pump working and have a backup if it goes out?
- 18 Are your Life Jackets good and readily handy?
- 19 Do you give your crew a safety "Tour" before each trip? Make sure they know where everything is and how to work it in case you are disabled?
 - 20 Have your throwable life preserver handy?
- 21 When was the last time you had your wheel bearings packed?

If you did not know the answer to any ONE of these questions, you failed this quick test.

Lucky for you, your boat isn't taking on water, or someone seriously injured and you aren't trying to answer any one of these questions in a panic to save a life!

You now have a chance to correct any of these shortcomings BEFORE your next outing, and avoid the serious consequences of not being prepared.

Remember --- Keep your VHF radio on! Don't miss a club members distress call!

Here are some temperature preferences for different species of fish that you might find useful. If you do not have a Roffs Sea Surface temperature subscription, you can ace usually (Depending on the Cloud Cover) get a good reading by going to our Website, over to the "General Info" tab. down to NOAA Weather. then look along the left side and you will find "Marine Weather". Click on it to go to their Marine weather page and scroll down to "Other Offshore Marine data" and you will find Sea Surface temperatures. I click On the "South Atlantic" link and from there you will notice as you move your mouse around on the page it displays the temperature AND Lat / Lon.

I will write down the Lat / Lon for where I think I would like to fish according to the Temps so I can enter them in my GPS for the day's fishing.

Like I said, with a lot of cloud cover there will be blank areas, and as the information is usually 8 to 10 hours old, by the time I get to a Lat / Lon, I use it for a reference only, and depend on my temperature gauge to find the warm water eddie or boundary I want to fish.
