### The 2015 El Cheapo Sheepshead Tournament is in the books!

Lots of drama for this year's event but in the end, Allen Hodges and crew took home the grand prize of a 2015 Carolina Skiff JVX 18 center console with a 60 horse

Mercury motor on a Magic Tilt trailer and various other prizes by weighing in a 9.49 pound Sheepshead. Second place went to Corey Williams with a 9.29 pound fish. Corey won a Carolina Skiff JV 15 TH with a 25 horse Mercury motor on a Magic Tilt trailer. 3rd place was taken by Kongphet Saysavanh with a 9.25 pound fish. He won a 15' Gheenoe with a 4 horse motor on a galvanized trailer. Alton Robey took 4th place honors and won a week-long vacation in Costa Rica plus \$1,000.00 cash. His fish weighed 9.2 pounds. Rounding up the top finishers, Louis Joseph took 5th

place and won \$750 cash with a 9.19 pound fish. Cash prizes were ordered through 15th place. A total of 352 boats were entered in the Tournament with 90 of them weighing fish.

In the Junior Angler Division, Garrett Vilett took top honors with an 8.14 pound fish. Ryan J Miller took second with an 8.11 followed very closely by Dalton Conner in third place with an 8.09 fish. Prizes for the juniors were also awarded through 15th place. A total of a 109 junior anglers fished with 26 of them weighing in.

A potential tournament record-breaking 13.42 pound Sheepshead was weighed but later disqualified for violation of Tournament rules.

The El Cheapo Sheepshead Tournament presented by the Jacksonville Offshore Sport Fishing Club is held annually the last full weekend in February and is one of the most popular fishing tournaments in the Southeast with its family friendly atmosphere, low cost entry fee and amazing price structure. Top's	Tips
Safety	First

With the El Cheapo Tournament held February 21 and the regular Club Tournaments starting March 21, everyone needs to start thinking about maintaining the proper fuel level to make sure you have sufficient fuel to make it out to your favorite fishing spot and back home.

One of the most often calls to towing services is for fuel when a boat runs out of fuel on the way back from a fishing trip offshore. If you use the "1/3<sup>rd</sup> rule"; use only 1/3<sup>rd</sup> on the way out, 1/3<sup>rd</sup> on the way back and save 1/3<sup>rd</sup> for reserve, you should never run out of fuel. When we think of fuel, or fueling, we normally think of the consumption of fuel. However, one thing we should always think about and be prepared for is fire on board when fueling the boat. There have been numerous occasions when boaters have become careless when fueling and wind up with a boat on fire. Although it is more dangerous when fueling an inboard versus an outboard, all can be hazardous to your health if proper safety procedures are not followed.

Before fueling, shut off your engines and all electrical appliances that may create a spark. Remember, if you spill fuel in the water when you are fueling your vessel, make sure all the fuel and vapors are cleared before you start your engines.

The same applies if you spill fuel in the bilge of your boat. If you are fueling an outboard with portable tanks, always remove the tanks from the boat and fuel them on the dock. If you should smell fuel, do not start your engines until the source of the smell has been determined and eliminated.

Also, to ensure that your boating/fishing trip is one that begins and ends safely, take the necessary steps in advance to make sure you do not run out of fuel offshore. Always check to make sure your fuel tank is full before starting a trip offshore. It will not only guard against you running out of fuel, but will also help reduce condensation in your fuel tank. When a partially empty fuel tank cools, some of the water vapor in the air condenses. Thus, when you leave your tank partially empty, you will slowly accumulate water, which could cause more problems later.

As some of you may already know, it's a horrible feeling to look at an empty fuel gauge after your motor sputters and quits. Keeping a full tank is one way to safeguard against this. Another safeguard is to follow the "one-third rule" mentioned above. This rule says use only one-third of your fuel on your trip out to sea, use one-third on the way back and save-one third for reserve. Why this formula? Why not use one-half out and one-half back? The reason being that the trip back may take more fuel than the trip out. When you go out, the wind and seas may be calm or from astern which would cause you to use less fuel than normal. When you turn around and head back home, you may find yourself now heading into a strong head wind and heavy seas which will cause you to use much more fuel than normal. Forward progress can be slow and fuel consumption high, which could cause you to run out of fuel.

If you start with a full tank, and if you use the onethird rule, you should never have to worry about running out of fuel. Before filling your fuel tank, make sure the engine is shut down and all electrical devices such as fans, navigational devices, radios, motors, generators and lights have been turned off.

To be on the safe side, if an inboard, operate your engine compartment blower for at least five minutes after fueling, and anytime you start the engine. In order to make sure your blower is venting the compartment properly, do not rely on the noise of the motor running, but instead put your hand over the vent to make sure air is exiting the vent.

Many times insects will build a nest in, and block the vent, so that the only way to know if the vent is working is to put your hand over it to test for air movement. Then, before starting your engine, use the best instrument you have for checking for gas fumes, your mark eight nose to check all compartments for gas fumes by sniffing for odors. Follow these rules and continue to enjoy safe boating throughout the year.

# Here are some Tips & Tricks of better boating!

For cleaning your boat, inside and out, all surfaces use VINEGAR, not Bleach. 2 parts Vinegar to 1 part Water.

Use Anhydrous Lanolin for Zippers, Snaps, and Shackle threads to prevent seizing. Most pharmacies carry it.

ONLY use 'A" rated fuel hoses because of the Ethanol in the gas.

IF you are going to do some wiring again only use BC 5 W2 Marine quality wire.

Check your Props to insure they are SMOOTH, use a file and honing stone to remove any nicks.

Change your Impeller every 3 years! Use Purosol's Sport / Marine Cleaner for your Electronics Screen.

'T' Clamps are the best hose clamp as they apply the pressure evenly and hold better.

When you get your Anchor, use chain that is at least half the length of your boat.

To mix your own 50:1 gas /oil, use2.5 oz of oil to 1 gal of gas.

Here is another tip that if you are not using, you are loosing! Salt Away, or it's twins Salt X, or Salt Terminator.

I recently had AJ of "Knot Dirty Detailing" do my boat. My boat is 19 years old. AJ said he was surprised at how good it looked and he would not have thought it was that old.

Use it to rinse off your boat, AND to flush your motors. To flush your motor you only run it through for about 30 seconds, just until you have the white foam coming out all the ports, you don't have to run it for a long time like with just water. Salt Away also lubricates and protects your impeller.

It really does get rid of the salt! It should be used every time you come back in to protect and prolong your boat and equipment!

### Nautical Terms, and Why.

Have you ever wondered why some people use Nautical terms on their boat, acting like old time sailors? Well I have the answer for you.

Lets start with Port and Starboard. First every boat has a Port side and a Starboard side. If you sit in the boat facing forward the Port side is on your LEFT, and naturally that makes the Starboard side on your RIGHT.

In old sailing days there was a board or plank that stuck out from the right (Or Starboard) side of the ship where the navigator would go out on to see the stars better so take a fix. Quite often this was a fixed board so when they came in to dock they always docked with the left side against the pier or dock, hence the terms Port and Starboard.

Now why use them? I have seen this happen more that once. A fisherman has a fish on the line and is fighting them. The fish is to the Stern (Or Back) of the boat, so the fisherman is facing the back. Now the Captain or person running the boat is facing forward. The fisherman wants the boat to turn to his right and yells "Turn Right" ..... so the Captain turns to HIS right, the wrong way! Now if everyone uses the nautical terms for the right and left, there will be no confusion, the fisherman says turn to Port and the Captain knows the he wants the boat to go left which is the fisherman's Right!

I have gone so far as to put plastic placards at the helm and on the back corners of the boat so people won't forget which way to tell me to turn.

You can also remember which is right or left with this saying. "You can always be LEFT in Port" Here as in a lot of the English language Port has a second different meaning and that is the place at land where the boats sail from or to. As in Port Jacksonville, or Port Miami.

Moat of the other nautical terms come from sailing ships where they gave the parts of the ship standard names to avoid confusion when telling someone which sail or mast or rope to adjust or where to go to find something or someone.

Nothing makes a fish bigger than ALMOST beeng caught!


