BROKE BACK MULLET

Men, you have spent all day with your wife or girlfriend during a stormy afternoon decorating your mullet. If it is going to be adorned with colorful skirts and other items all this will go to waste if you do not pierce your mullet properly. Proper piercing of your mullet can make everyone's life more enjoyable. Simply jabbing and stabbing hap hazardously at the head is not the ideal way you want to proceed. Such careless techniques can leave your mullet lifeless and unusable. Piercing the head is a small but crucial point that one should not take lightly. When it comes to your mullet, one needs to consider how it should be pierced. Piercing is probably the most important part of the whole mullet rig and one should give great thought to this piercing technique.

There are six basic techniques when it comes to making a hole through your mullet. These methods are: the standard needle method, cannula method, and scalpel method, taper method the dermal punch and the piercing gun. Some of these techniques may be better than others; however, unless you have a lifeless mullet then you any want to concentrate on one or two techniques. Let's explore some of the more exotic techniques starting with the cannula and the dermal punch. The dermal punch combines the scalpel method and the needle method. The dermal punch has the user removing the top few layers of the skin by usually scraping it off with a knife or a scalpel as to make a piercing hole through the head easier. Then, just take

your needle and punch right on through it. The cannula method is like the needle method except one uses a tube to punch through the skin. When using this technique, be careful that the tube and the needle eye are compatible. Nothing is more aggravating then when the tube



will not pass through the eye opening. The more traditional method is the straight forward needle method. Just take a needle or something like the sort such as an ice pick and punch a hole through the head of your mullet. The bigger the hole thus the bigger an eye you can use. If the head is too tough and you do not have a scalpel or piercing gun then just step on the head to break it but carefully as not to flatten the head. Ouch, this would hurt paying all that money for a mullet you could not use.

Now rigging the mullet is just a tricky as piercing the mullet. Please make sure that any skirts and crimps are added before the leader is passed through the mullet. Now when the hole is made, insert the hook eye back up the mullet and into the mullet's head. Now take the tag end and force it though the top hole coming out the chin. Extend the tag end downward and now add on your appropriate chin weight and then have the tag end come back through the crimp at the beginning of the leader and crimp down. If you do not do this right then either your wife or girlfriend will not be too happy with you because the unsuspecting fish will be able to make off without you being any the wiser. You will be left there hold just your skirt in hand, how embarrassing. In order to test your rig, in one hand hold the leader above the mullet and in the other hand hold the hook. More than three tugs on the hook then you are playing with your mullet instead of fishing with it. Take three tugs at the hook and this will let you see if the hook will simply pull away from the mullet. If this occurred then you have failed to properly pass the leader through the hook eye.

So what do you plan on catching with your mullet? Just what would be attracted to this mullet? As the age old adage goes, the more expensive bling the more attractive that mullet is. Personally, my two favorite targets are dolphin and tuna. Very tasty fish and great game fish as well. As for the dolphin, they will hit just about anything you can put in front of them; however, the big ones, the trophies are and can be more picky because they have learned their lesson along the way. A tasty tuna has very nice eyes and thus they are harder to fool. It's not just your average bling that these fish go for. Remember, with those eyes and attitude, keeping it more natural tends to work out better. Just

WEAR YOUR LIFE JACKET



On April 16, of this year, an accident offshore of Talbot Island reminds us of the need to wear our life jackets when on the water. As a result of the investigation, it was determined that the two fishermen had anchored about 300 yards offshore of Talbot Island to fish. The weather that morning was calm but it

increased in intensity as time progressed. At around 1 p.m. the surf had gotten real rough and a wave swamped the boat and then capsized it. The two occupants were ejected into the water and neither had a life jacket on. One occupant was able to find a life jacket, place it under his body, and swim to shore. He was unable to find his friend, and once on shore he asked another fisherman to call for help. The victim's body was later recovered from the surf. The cause of death was determined to be drowning.

The above is a stark reminder to wear your life jacket when on the water. According to U.S. Coast Guard statistics, nearly 90% of all boaters who drown are not wearing life jackets. So, don't let your boat guests tell you they do not need one. At least, give them one and ask them to adjust it so it will fit properly in case of an emergency. A life jacket should fit snugly; it should not be loose enough to slide up over the wearer's mouth or ears. This is especially true for children. That means children should have child-sized jackets. Store your life jackets so they are easily accessible when not worn and those with missing or torn straps should be replaced.

With the advent of warmer weather and Club Tournaments on the schedule, I think it is a very appropriate time to remind the Club membership of the fact that the successful fishing / boating trip is the one that begins and ends safely. One way to ensure a safe outing on the water is to wear your life jacket. Although not required by law, except for children 13 years of age and younger,

boaters should wear a life jacket especially when the boat is underway. Historical data shows that many excellent swimmers have drowned when thrown from a moving boat without wearing a flotation device of some type. Recently we had a near tragic accident when a small boat, with 3 fishermen, capsized near the jetties. Since the fishermen were not wearing life jackets, only the quick action of some nearby fishermen prevented a tragedy.

As a practical matter, I know that many of you will not wear your life jacket. If the life jacket is not worn, however, it should be at least readily accessible and available for immediate donning in an emergency such as a vessel sinking, fire, etc. One place it would be readily available is draped over the helm seat back. Please keep in mind that a life jacket will be of no help to you if you are thrown from the boat without the life jacket on. A life jacket should not be stowed in a closed or locked compartment, or have other gear stowed on top of it.

If your boat is 16 feet or longer, you must have a throwable floatation device in addition to wearable ones for each person on board the vessel. The throwable device must be immediately available near the helm and all persons on board should be informed of its position and use. All recreational boats must carry one type 1, 2, 3, or 5 floatation device for each person on board. Any boat 16 feet or over, except canoes and kayaks, must also carry one type 4 (throwable) device.

Most recreational boaters elect to carry the type III floatation device which is designed to keep the wearer vertical in the water and where quick rescue is probable, The type 2 floatation device, or near shore buoyant vest, is designed to turn a person to a vertical position in the water, but not as pronounced as the type I.

The type I floatation device is designed to turn an unconscious person from face down to a vertical position and is used by boaters cruising waters where there is a probability of a delayed rescue. The type V floatation device, or flotation suit, provides not only flotation, but also protection from hypothermia and is intended for special; use activities. No matter what type of lifejacket you carry on your vessel, it will only work when worn.

Make it a point to at least wear your life jacket when running from one spot to another. If you encounter a rouge wake or wave and are thrown from the boat your chances of survival are increased. Wear your life jacket and continue to enjoy safe boating throughout the year.

KING MACKEREL

Order - Perciformes Family - Scombridae Genus - Scomberomorus Species - cavalla

King Mackerel are primarily marketed fresh. They may be sold as fillets, steaks, or in the round (whole). Their raw flesh is grayish, due to its high fat content. They are best prepared by broiling, frying, baking or, especially for large "smoker" king, by smoking.

King mackerel are voracious, opportunistic carnivores. Their prey depends on their size. They favor squid, menhaden and other sardine-like fish (Clupeidae), jacks (Carangidae), cutlassfish (Trichiuridae), weakfish (Sciaenidae), grunts (Haemulidae), striped anchovies (Engraulidae), cigar minnows, threadfin, northern mackerel and (blue runners).

The Greater Jax kingfish Tournament has asked us to cook for them. They used to have several vendors selling food at their site, but not this year.


