# FEEDING TIME

The Solunar Tables from the website <a href="www.sstcharts.com">www.sstcharts.com</a> typically shows when minor and major feeding times should take place for pelagic species such as kingfish. Many of many tournament fisherman spend their entire lives attempting to know when their targeted species many strike. Knowing this will allow one to know when to pull back on the throttles or to know just how far they can run before the magic hour arrives. Nearly any dock talk will eventually turn to bite information. 'What did you catch your fish on?' is a prime example along with 'what time did you catch it?' You can do this or you can spend hours studding the chart below just to know when you may find the most optimal feeding time.

Yet through my years of fishing I was ignorant to what I had in front of me. Yes, ignorant! I have had several people show me tricks to the trade to predict the best feeding time while out there on the water. One of the best methods was kinda of a dance of sorts. You had to place your arms in the air to form a "Y". Next you had to rotate our head around to gauge where the sun was in relationship to the outstretched arms. After finding the sun, turn your body around and wiggle your hips to the tune of *YMCA* by the Village People so everyone can see what type of fisherman you really might be. Depending upon the relationship of the sun to the outstretched arms would indicate when the bite may take place. It had something to do with 10am and 2 pm time frames or so it was told. If the crew was unlucky and you did this at the end of the day, then we pray the crew makes it home alive because your deodorant is likely not working by this time.

The correlation was obvious yet it was easy to miss. In order to know the proper major and minor bite times all I had to do was to keep track of when the kids wanted to eat. For example, here is a young lad grazing through the food cooler. Packing a food cooler is a highly developed art form in itself. As seen here, the young lad has set his sights on the bread wrapper full of PB&J sandwiches and he is looking for more thus indicating a major bite is forth coming. The major bite will likely take shape in two various ways. First, the food cooler will begin to empty and second an unsuspecting poogy is likely to meet its faith real soon or so we hope. In order to have either a minor or a major bite take place, the food cooler buffet must be attractive enough for the kids. Items such as Nabisco's Chips Ahoy, Quaker's Chewy Granola Bar, chips and fresh fruit like cantaloupe, apples and oranges plus some Gatoraid



# Top's Tips Safety First

#### RULES OF THE ROAD

I will start out again this month by citing some of the very grim boating fatality statistics from the Florida Marine Police. For instance, the latest 2010 statistics show that most boating fatalities to date are from drowning.... Nearly 90% were not wearing life jackets when they entered the water. Following is an example:

On July 7 two Georgia men returning to shore were hit by a series of large waves when James Collins, 56, fell overboard and never resurfaced. He was not wearing a life jacket when he entered the water. Boating fatalities to date are 37 which are the same as 2009 to date.

Since we are in the middle of the summer vacation and boating season, I think it is appropriate, at this time, to remind everyone of the need to adhere to the rules of the road when on the water for pleasure or fishing. Many new boaters, and some old ones, do not appear to have a working knowledge of the rules of the road. If you are operating your vessel on inland waters or the high seas, one way to insure a safe voyage is to adhere to the "Navigation Rules".

The rules cover all aspects of Navigation including lights, sounds, shapes, distress and privileged vs giveway vessel, etc. All vessels, from the smallest PWC to the largest supertanker, must obey the navigation rules. It takes a whole book to cover all the rules, so in this article I want to discuss only the privileged and burdened vessel aspect of the rules.

There are important differences in legal liability between Maritime Law and Civil Law. When driving, one automobile often has the legal right-of-way over another. For instance, at an intersection, if car A has a green light and car B runs through the red light and collides with car a, then car B is usually found to be at fault.

Unlike the highway, at sea no one has the right of way. Depending on the situation, when two vessels are closing one vessel is privileged or the stand on vessel and the other is the burdened or give way vessel. The privileged or stand on vessel must maintain course and speed and the burdened or give way vessel must alter course and/or speed to avoid the privileged vessel. If the burdened vessel does not take action as required by the rules and the two vessels reach "extremis" (that point where a collision will occur without evasive action by either vessel), the privileged vessel must depart from the rules and take evasive action.

In a crossing situation, you are the privileged vessel if the other vessel is from dead ahead to 22.5 degrees abaft your port beam, and you must maintain course and speed. If the other vessel is from dead ahead to 22.5 degrees abaft your starboard beam, you are the burdened vessel and must alter course to pass astern of the privileged vessel. NEVER speed up to pass in

front of a privileged vessel. In a meeting head-on situation, both vessels are burdened and must alter course to starboard. In an overtaking situation, the vessel overtaking the other is the burdened vessel and must avoid the other.

Remember, courtesy and common sense is as important as the navigation rules. If the other captain is rude, don't use it for rudeness on your part. If the other vessel does not treat you in accordance with the rules, sound the danger signal (5 or more short blasts on you horn) and yield. More than likely the other captain may be ignorant of the rules. By engaging in brinksman ship, you could win the argument and ruin your whole day and possibly damage you vessel.

Remember, you are in imminent danger of collision when the bearing of another vessel is constant and the range is decreasing and evasive action will be required regardless of who is privileged or burdened. If you are not sure of the federal or state navigation rules, you can check the rules by looking at a copy of the "Federal Requirements & Safety Tips" and/or "The Florida Boater's Guide" in the rack by the door of the clubhouse. Follow these simple navigation rules and continue to enjoy safe boating throughout the year.


