#### Cabo

If there's a Mecca for fishermen it's got to be Cabo san Lucas. The town is known internationally for its marlin, sailfish, tuna, wahoo, and dorado. Several major tournaments are held each year from this port and it's always been a dream of mine to fish this area. This October my wife Jan, myself, and our friends Brien and Marge Hackbart got to do just that. Day 1 I knew this trip would be exciting, but just not how much. The first rental car came with a lack of air conditioning. Not a good idea in the Mexican Baja. The reissue was much better but on the way into Cabo I found that I had "misplaced" my cash, all of it. We did a quick turn around and actually found the misplaced money in the first car. Enough excitement for day 1. We then proceeded to Minerva's Bait and Tackle in Cabo to make sure all was

ready for Monday's trip. It was. Since the Regina at the Westin was 22 km from Cabo we decided to check in and call it a day. Dav 3 Monday came early, like any of us slept with the anticipation of the trip. We needed to be at the docks early to purchase fishing licenses. The FWC might take a lesson from the Mexican authorities. All of the names on the boat must match the names on the licenses. The authorities are on a long pier, which your charter will pull up to and present its papers. The M-16's on the reviewing officers add a certain weight to the seriousness of the event. On the way out we purchased bait from vendors who pulled along side in their pangas. And then out to the Pacific. After running for about an hour up the coast it was lines in, and fish on. Jan had first strike, and put a peanut dorado in the boat. From leaving our dock to fish on was actually 1 hour and 15 minutes. We then proceed to add 4 more to the box, missed the next one, and then proceeded to the Golden Gate. Actually Joel, our captain just said let's go catch some marlin and off we went. Since this guy had put us on fish right away I had a modicum of faith in his statement.

#### Cabo continued

At the area defined as the Golden Gate we switched to live bait. Two lives were quickly free lined, and within 10 minutes it was fish on. Brien was in the chair with a TLD 20 spooled with 30# and connected to one angry Striped Marlin. One thing that I can attest to is that these crews really know how to use their boats to aid in the catch. With Brien's skills thrown in we had a 150 to 170 # marlin on the stern for some



quick pictures, and a quicker release. The catch and release ethic is firmly entrenched with these boats, and marlin are only kept if there is no chance of a good release. Jan was next up and I was a little worried about her. She had cut her right hand a week before and still had 5 stitches in it. Within minutes she was on a nice Striped Marlin. Not to be forgotten, Marge was hooked up soon afterwards. Now we had a double going. After 15 minutes I asked Jan if her hand was alright. She replied."It hurts like hell, and I am not giving up this rod". The look in her eyes told me she wasn't kidding. She boated the fish, about a 120# Striped Marlin about 10 minutes later.



Marge was still on and this fish was giving as well as it got. We actually had to disentangle lines from another boat twice. It managed to take enough line to be cut off by another boat. This area is popular to say the least. At this time there were probably 30 boats all fishing the same area, and 1/3 to half were hooked up. Boat handling skills are paramount here. The next fish was mine, and it came the boat quickly. Marge took

the next one since she was the only one of us who hadn't boated a marlin. After a good 20 minute fight she had her fish. Brien boated another Striped Marlin to close out the day. Going 5 for 6 on your first marlin trip is kind of nice. Who am I kidding, it's fantastic.

Day 5 This is about fishing, not shopping so I'm skipping the irrelevant material. Suffice to say that Cabo has enough silver shops to satisfy all. Brien and I had decided to try a panga. We had hopped to try for some Ribbon fish or Pargo, but were told that the water was too warm. So up the coast we went and 3 dorado and 4 hours later we were back. I had really been interested in fishing from a panga, so it was a worthwhile trip. I liked the ride, but not the ability to touch both gunnels at the same time.

Day 6 Since this was our final trip we told the captain that we didn't need to catch any dorado. He agreed and brought out the 50 wides and an 80 wide. We were looking for Blue Marlin. Naturally the first lure in immediately hooked up a gaffer dorado. We trolled for about 3 hours, eventually getting out to the Golden Gate area. On the way out we did boat a nice Striped Marlin. Jan and Marge were both amazed at how quickly the 50 wides boated the fish. But with the live bait it was back to TLD 20's and a Penn 16T. The deal is you get to work the fish, and they get to work you. It wasn't long and we were on fish again. This time I was in the chair, and my fish was definitely into spending as much time in the air as in the water. One hugely spectacular jump wound up throwing the hook. We had just started free lining again and the captain yelled for lines in. He'd spotted a huge school of bait, and that meant fish. We flew to the bait pod, along with 15 other boats. Two lines out and immediately 2 fish were on. Jan had one and Marge the other. Jan's came in fast, concluding his run by tail walking from starboard to the port side right at the boat. You could say he was a little green, but we had the leader, and a release. While all of this is going on Brien and I are watching lit up marlin all around and under the boat chasing bait. Marge on the other hand was into a fish with attitude. Whatever line she gained, he'd take back with a vengeance. After 25 minutes he just wore Marge out. She relinquished the rod to me and it was game on again. It took about 20 more minutes to bring him to the side of the boat. I've caught some big fish, but this one was definitely the strongest. We didn't pull him on board, but he was in the 170# class.

We ended the day with 4 for 5 marlin, giving us 9 for 11 on the marlin, and 9 for 11 on the dorado. Not a bad couple of days.

We ended the trip Friday night with a visit to the Giggling Marlin, an establishment I highly recommend for liquid refreshment. That's also a great story, but what happens in Cabo, stays in Cabo.

After being home for a couple of weeks I can look back at it and say it was worth the expense. And I'm pretty sure Jan and will be back in the future. There's still the Blues and the Blacks to dance with.

Top's Típs Safety Fírst

#### Top Ingram Safety Officer

After reading Rob's story "Into the storm", and seeing the news story on TV about the 21 foot Hydra-Sport boat capsizing off Mayport in the recent storm, I thought it would be a good idea to remind everyone of the need to take proper precautions when boating in heavy weather and rough seas.

As cold weather fronts begin moving through our area over the next couple of months, we can expect to encounter more severe weather and rougher seas when we head out to our favorite fishing spot. Also, I would like to remind everyone that the Captain of a vessel is responsible for the safety of his/her vessel and the crew.

Boating and fishing is usually done in fair weather. Over the winter months the seas and weather can be very dangerous. However, if you should consider going out in your boat in rough deteriorating weather, my advice is "don't do it". There are times, however, that you may be out and get caught in bad weather before you can return to port. An understanding of the principles of heavy weather seamanship is helpful if this should happen to you.

Heavy weather, in itself, does not place a small boat in danger. A solid boat, operated by a knowledgeable skipper is usually equal to the task. In fact, your boat can probably take more adverse weather conditions than you can. If the sea state increases and you must run into the wind, the bow of your boat will plow into the waves instead of lifting up over them. This will not only cause your boat to take a tremendous pounding, but your propeller will rise out of the water causing your engine to race wildly one moment and load the next as it falls back into the water.

If you find yourself in this situation, slow your boat so the bow can lift with the waves. Then, instead of running directly into the waves, take them at about a 45 degree angle. Your boat will go up and down on its long axis and up and down sideways (pitch and role). Pitching and rolling are easier on you and your boat than the pounding caused by going directly into the waves.

In heavy seas, you may have to run a "zig-zag" course taking the seas broad on your bow for awhile then off your quarter in order to reach your destination. If you find it difficult to make headway under these conditions, recommend you lay to. That is, use only enough power to keep your bow headed into the wind. Adjust your speed so that you are making neither headway nor sternway.

If you find yourself in a situation with a following sea in heavy weather, you have to be concerned about broaching or pitchpoling. In deep water a following sea is usually not as much of a problem as in shallow water. In a following sea, the force of the water can cause your boat to yaw wildly from side to side. The greatest danger occurs when your boat rises on an overtaking wave, its propeller comes out of the water and you no longer have control. At this point it may be thrown broadside into the trough and rolled over (broach) by the next wave. To avoid a broach, you must keep your motor or outdrive in the water by adjusting your speed to stay just behind the crest of the wave in front of you and ahead of the wave behind you. Once a broach has started it is almost impossible to stop.

Should you lose power and find yourself in danger of broaching, throw out a sea anchor to keep your bow into the wind. If you do not have a sea anchor, a bucket or other object can be used. As a last resort, if depth permits, drop your regular anchor. Never, I repeat, never anchor by the stern of your boat.

If you don't stay behind a wave's crest, you may find yourself racing down the forward face of the wave at a greatly increased speed. Your boat can then plow into the trough burying its bow in water. The next wave may pick up your stern and flip your boat end over end (pitchpole). Follow these simple suggestions and may you continue to enjoy safe boating throughout the year. Top Ingram
